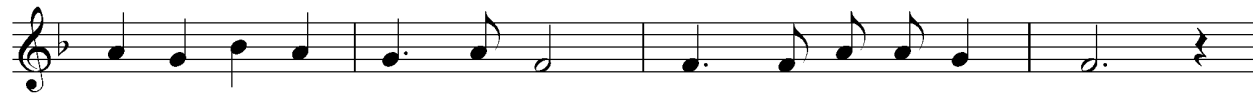

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days, you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

DISTRIBUTION


The ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the people.

Celebrant This is Christ's Banquet. It is made ready for those who love God, and for those who want to love God more. So, come, you who have much faith and you who have little, you who have been here often, and you who have not been here long. You who have tried to follow Jesus, and you who have failed. Come, because it is Christ who invites you.

During Communion, all are welcome – even encouraged! – to come forward to receive the holy food of new and everlasting life in Jesus Christ. Simply put your hands out (one on top of the other), and the bread will be placed in your hand. (If needed, gluten-free wafers are available.)

You may then consume the wafer (if you do not wish to have it intincted in the wine) or leave the wafer on your palm and the chalice bearer will dip it for you into the wine and place it in your hand. If you aren't sure, or if you'd rather not receive the actual Sacrament, come up and cross your arms across your chest to receive a blessing. You may also cross your arms over your chest or touch the bottom of the chalice if you wish not to receive wine. Finally, if you'd like to receive Communion but mobility is an issue, alert an usher and Communion will be brought to you.

OUR OWN OFRENDA



El Dia de los Muertos, also known as **the Day of the Dead**, is a tradition of welcoming back deceased loved

ones, remembering and honoring their lives. It is not a spooky holiday; it is a celebration and serves to portray death as a natural cycle of the human experience. On the Day of the Dead, according to tradition, it is believed that the souls of the dead awaken and return to the living to eat, drink, and be merry with their loved ones. In preparation, the living family members prepare an *ofrenda* – an altar covered with pictures, favorite foods, drinks, and other items of the ones they miss. This year, The Church of the Epiphany will have its own ofrenda. **Before or after church on Sunday, October 30 or from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Monday, October 31 through Thursday, November 3**, we encourage you to bring pictures and items of ones you have lost and place them on our ofrenda. You may also contribute on Sunday, November 6. The service on Sunday will include a prayer for them.

El Día de los Muertos, también conocido como the Day of the Dead, es una tradición de dar la

bienvenida a los seres queridos fallecidos, recordando y honrando sus vidas. No es un día festivo espeluznante; es una celebración y sirve para retratar la muerte como un ciclo natural de la experiencia humana. En el Día de los Muertos, según la tradición, se cree que las almas de los muertos despiertan y regresan a los vivos para comer, beber y divertirse con sus seres queridos. En preparación, los miembros vivos de la familia preparan una ofrenda, un altar cubierto con imágenes, comidas favoritas, bebidas y otros artículos de los que extrañan. Este año, The Church of the Epiphany tendrá su propia ofrenda. **Antes o después de la iglesia el domingo 30 de octubre o de 9:00 a.m. a 3:00 p.m. del lunes 31 de octubre al jueves 3 de noviembre**, lo alentamos a traer fotos y artículos de los que ha perdido y colocarlos en nuestra ofrenda. También puede contribuir el domingo 6 de noviembre. El servicio de ese domingo incluirá una oración por ellos.
